NO REALLY, IT'S A "HUT"
A space-age, low-impact lodge lands in the Alps BY CAROLYN WHELAN

Set at 9,169 feet in the Swiss Alps, the Monte Rosa Hut is a three-hour, cross-glacier like from a train station outside Zermatt (Rotenboden). So when it came time for a S6 million renovation, Swiss engineers faced a Matterborn-size challenge, "Picture an island," says Marcel Baumgartner, the project's lead architect, "The hut had to make its own energy and water, use mostly natural light and biodegradable materials, and it had to blend with the landscape." Um, done, Once a leaky, drafty, 114-year-old trekkers' lodge, the reimagined but opens again this March as a model of green design (\$31; section-monte-rosa.ch). Here, some thin-air highlights.
